The first pillar in our Build Forward Together Strategic Plan is to expand homeownership opportunities. At The Heights development in St. Paul's Greater East Side, we're doing just that—building up to 150 Habitat homes over the coming years.

We're kicking off construction at The Heights in a big way: with the 2024 Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project. We're thrilled to host this annual event in the Twin Cities from September

29 through October 4, 2024. During its 40-year history, the Carter Work Project has traveled to 14 countries and brings together thousands of volunteers, celebrities, elected officials, and other VIPs to build homes and cast a global spotlight on the urgent importance of affordable housing.

We're deeply honored to celebrate the legacy and impact that the former President and First Lady have created with Habitat for Humanity.

Get to Know St. Paul's Greater East Side

Located in the northeast corner of St. Paul, Twin Cities Habitat's development at The Heights is part of the ancestral lands of the Dakota people. Since the beginning of European settlement, the East Side has been a diverse community with immigrants from all over the world.

For most of the 20th century, the land was a private Jewish golf course, formed when Jews were excluded from other clubs. Ron Zamansky, whose family were members of the Hillcrest Golf Club, remembers, "There was a


great relationship between Hillcrest and the non-Jewish community around it. Families who grew up at Hillcrest still feel connected to that land."


Twin Cities Habitat has a long history on the East Side, too. Xue Yang and her husband came to the U.S. as young children, from Thailand and Laos respectively. They bought their Habitat home on the East Side in 2019. They love the neighborhood markets. "We go to Hmong Village—you see immigrants from other areas come there for things they can't find at other

big box stores," Xue said. "There are Somali pop-up markets, Karen garden shops; Mexican families shop there too. It's such a beautiful mix of people."

The Heights is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the East Side and for Twin Cities Habitat. We're building relationships, engaging neighbors, and investing deeply in the future of this richly diverse community.

Get to Know The Heights

The 2024 Carter Work Project kicks off Twin Cities Habitat's largest development ever at The Heights. The broader project—led by the St. Paul Port Authority—is a transformational redevelopment of the 112-acre former Hillcrest Golf Course that prioritizes community connectivity, affordable housing, and outdoor amenities to residents who live, work, and visit the area.


In total, The Heights development will bring 1,000 units of affordable housing and 1,000 livingwage jobs to the Greater East Side. Twin Cities Habitat will build 147 homes on four city blocks totaling 12 acres. The Habitat homes will be a mix of single-family homes, twin homes, three-plex townhomes, and four-plex townhomes.

The Heights will be an all-electric community that has the potential to be one of the most energy efficient developments ever created in Minnesota. We're using innovative building practices to make this a modern, sustainable development with lower utility costs for residents.

A Look Back at the 2010 Carter Work Project

Hosting the Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project is usually a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for a Habitat affiliate. But for Twin Cities Habitat, it's a twice-in-a-lifetime opportunity—we were one of four affiliates across the United States selected for the 2010 event. Here's a look back.

"When I arrived early that morning, I wasn't expecting to see a crowd of journalists on the stage waiting in front of my home construction site. There were nearly 200 people! At the end of his speech, Jimmy Carter gave me a Bible. I had goosebumps when I received it!"

"I was able to build on the East Side of St. Paul with President Carter. I also recall going to Minneapolis to meet with Vice President Mondale and Senator Al Franken. It's a great memory from my mayoral days. What was also memorable was how thrilled the homeowners were!"



Tony Beckstrom was the Site Supervisor on a home where Jimmy Carter volunteered.

"Jimmy Carter was absolutely the sweetest, kindest man I've ever met in my life. He used our drill and Sabre saw, but not the nail gun. Anything he could do with his own tools, he'd use them. When he installed siding, he didn't use the nail gun; he used his grandfather's hammer."

Habitat didn't just check a box.

We changed.

With your support, we've created a groundbreaking *Advancing Black Homeownership* program that's leading the way in the Habitat network.

When Monisha Washington applied to Twin Cities Habitat's homeownership program, it wasn't just for her family. It was for her community.

"I am a community health worker, so I'm always looking for resources to share — but I like to go through the process first. That was why I chose Twin Cities Habitat, because this is something that can help me obtain homeownership, and I could see if it would be good for my community as well."

When Monisha began the process in 2020, it was bumpier than she was expecting. Barriers kept popping up, like a low credit score and student loans impacting her debt-to-income ratio. And while she had a great financial coach through Habitat, Monisha felt he didn't understand the barriers she faced from a cultural standpoint.

"I thought that if I'm having these barriers, I need to make sure this process is not only okay for me, but okay for my community."

Diving into the Data

The Twin Cities metro has one of the highest rates of homeownership in the nation, but it also has one of the worst racial gaps in homeownership. The Black homeownership rate in the Twin Cities is 29% compared to a White homeownership rate

of 76%. The 47% gap is not only one of the biggest, but Black households' homeownership rate is 16% lower than national Black homeownership rates. This glaring disparity is the result of a long history of racial discrimination in housing, from racial covenants and redlining to interstates destroying Black neighborhoods.


Years before Monisha began her homeownership journey, Twin Cities Habitat had begun a racial equity journey. While we were proud that about 85% of our homeowners were people of color, we wanted to ensure we were helping to close that racial homeownership gap. Led by Shereese Turner, Chief Program Officer, we took a deep dive into the data. And the results were shocking.

"The truth is the racial disparities in our region were replicated within our own programs," says Shereese. In fact, Foundational Black homebuyers — those descended from enslaved people — were the second largest demographic group applying for Habitat homeownership, but were least likely to complete our program and become homeowners.

"We knew we needed to make a change," Shereese says. "And we knew we needed to do it *with* community."

Making a Change

To find a way forward, Twin Cities Habitat brought in Dr. Brittany Lewis and her community-centered firm Research in Action. They helped form a Black Homeownership Advisory Council made up of Habitat homeowners, homebuyers, and other community members who identified as Foundational Black Households.

When Monisha was asked to be part of the Advisory Council, she knew this was a perfect opportunity to improve Habitat's program for people like her. She joined and shared the barriers she had faced, like her credit score and student loans.

"I learned that I wasn't the only one struggling with these things," Monisha remembers. "Many of us had the same struggles. Being a part of the Advisory Council and being heard was so important and valuable."

"It was *hard* listening to how challenging it was for some homebuyers to go through our program," Shereese says. "Because it's one thing when we *think* we know what's going on, but it's another when we could hear what *is* going on."

After months of listening and learning from the Advisory Council and completing additional research, Dr. Lewis' team presented recommendations to improve Habitat's programs for Foundational Black homebuyers.

Building a New Program

"When we got these recommendations from the Advisory Council, we took them to heart," Shereese shares. The result was our *Advancing Black* Homeownership program, launched in 2022. It's a race-based program that addresses barriers unique to Foundational Black homebuyers, and is the first of its kind in the Habitat for Humanity network.

"Everything that Monisha and others shared, we built into the program," Shereese says. "We factored things like rent payments into creditworthiness. We adjusted how we assess student loans in the debt-to-income calculation. We provided additional financial support so our savings requirement isn't a barrier when you're going into mortgage readiness, and to also expand the number of homes you could buy."

A unique aspect of the program is the cohort coaching model, which utilizes culturally relevant peer-to-peer coaching and community connections, a specialized curriculum that includes healing from financial trauma, developing financial resilience, and referrals for debt consolidation.

The program has been a huge success. In the first 19 months, 46 Foundational Black families have become Habitat homeowners. Foundational Black families now make up 22% of Habitat's total homebuyers — up from just 8% in 2019. Other Habitat affiliates across the country are exploring creating similar programs in their communities.



Finding Home

In the end, Monisha persevered to buy a home with Twin Cities Habitat on the open market. So many things excite her about being a homeowner — like sharing her home with others.

"I have seven siblings, and the fact that I can have them all over and we can have fun, play, and gather together is incredible," Monisha says with a laugh. "And this is something that I can not only have for myself, but I can leave it for generations to come — to build wealth."

"It wasn't just about me in this journey. It was about me, my family, and what I can provide for everyone else around me as well."

Through the Advisory Council, Monisha has provided so much for those around her. She sees that impact already.

"I work with a lot of organizations that invite the community to the table and guess what? They have their agenda already set ... they just have to check the 'advisory council' box. One thing that was different about this experience was *Habitat* didn't just check the box — they changed ... and I can see those changes benefitting my community." A New Vision of Partnership Housing

Habitat for Humanity was founded on the concept of "partnership housing," where those in need of shelter worked side-by-side with volunteers to build homes. The ethos of partnership housing evolved into "Sweat Equity," a requirement that homebuyers spend a set number of hours contributing to Habitat's mission, typically on a build site. The intention is to demonstrate the homebuyer's willingness to partner with Habitat.

Through research, we learned that many homebuyers needed to take unpaid time off work, experienced income loss, scrambled to find childcare, and spent less time with

their family. The burden fell hardest on Black households, particularly single Black moms. The program, we found, was not equitable.

So, we rolled up our sleeves and innovated a new vision of partnership housing rooted in racial equity. This optional, client-centered program is called Volunteer and Learn. It removes a barrier to homeownership while maintaining the best intentions of Sweat Equity: education for success in homeownership, community building, and creating a sense of pride for homeowners.



At Twin Cities Habitat, we're proud to be the largest builder of affordable single-family homes in Minnesota. But we need to do more than build our way out of the housing crisis. That's why, in addition to lifting our hammers, we lift our voices to increase public support for investments in affordable housing.

Each year since 2009, Twin Cities Habitat has engaged thousands of our volunteers in advocacy work at all levels of government. We've had some big successes together. Really big. Just last year, we advocated for a new First-Generation Down Payment Assistance Fund. It will help 3,000 Minnesotans become homeowners and reduce Minnesota's racial disparity in homeownership. The Fund passed—and we've already started administering the down payment assistance at Twin Cities Habitat.
